1.	To note that the action table summarising the meeting of the Environmental Forum held on 12 June 2019 was confirmed as a correct record.	
2.	Matters arising: There were no matters arising.	

- An introduction to the New Biodiversity Projects Officer
 A brief introduction was provided by Petrina Llewellyn, who welcomed everyone to the meeting.
- 4. Presentations by: John Shaw and Timothy Tims "Plant more Trees"

A presentation discussed the 750 tree planting project in Rickmansworth, which is to mark a key anniversary at St Mary's Church and to help plant trees to combat global warming and encourage tree planting in Rickmansworth. The project involves local churches and is working with local schools.

It was mentioned that Ray Figg and Three Rivers District Council Tree Officers have kindly agreed to plant 2 trees for St Mary's Church by the Batchworth Roundabout and both Timothy Tims and John Shaw are grateful.

The Cedar tree at the Council was also mentioned and highlighted how important the tree was and discussed the process of photosynthesis.

It is hoped by next October that children from the Batchworth Community Council area will plant trees such as silver birch and oak.

Cllr Lloyd and Cllr Williams are happy to discuss further with Timothy Tims and John Shaw about the project and to provide help/ contact with local schools.

Cllr Tankard and Cllr Phil Williams reported they are also looking into a verge project, rewilding project and also looking into options for planting trees in their areas.

In addition, Tim Hill mentioned that biodiversity loss was also important in relation to the Climate crisis and that every habitat can capture carbon to help reduce temperatures. Tim reported that trees, soil, grassland and other habitats are important for carbon capture. Tim referred to the Hertfordshire State of Nature 2019 report. He also mentioned Ash Die back and Oak Processionary Moth are other issues that need to be addressed.

Cllr Chris Lloyd also mentioned that when planting trees groups need to budget for the maintenance of the trees. He also thanked the Three Rivers and County teams who have been busy with extra tree work caused by the recent storms.

Barnaby Jackson asked about funding sources for planting trees for projects and suggested it might be good to arrange a TRDC meeting to discuss further.

Presentation by Elen Roberts "Recycling and Waste in Three Rivers"

A presentation was given by Elen Roberts. She discussed how food waste is recycled at an anaerobic digestion plant under a Hertfordshire County Council contract and is promoting the Love Food Hate Waste campaign, and the Remember Your Reusables campaign run by WasteAware. Elen also reported about the Resources and Waste Strategy.

Cllr Williams reported that Three Rivers District Council was really good at recycling and were third in the country in 2018/19.

Russell Ball asked whether Elen goes to schools and Elen reported that discussions were made in schools especially Eco Councils and she was talking to teachers in terms of waste and recycling. Elen will also be doing assemblies and activities in schools.

Graham Everett reported about issues around plastics and if there is a risk of contamination to landfill.

Elen reported that landfill contamination was only 4%, which was very good.

Tim Hill mentioned that it is important to look at "Waste Water" and we can all do our bit to help conserve water to help habitats, e.g. along the River Colne, which is a very important river habitat in Hertfordshire.

Jennie Probert reported that it was important not to waste water.

Barnaby Jackson asked if it would be possible to recycle soft plastics? Elen reported that soft plastics may be phased out in due course.

Jennie Probert mentioned the necessity of keeping batteries out of bins.

Cllr Williams reported that paper bags are best for composting.

Presentation by Rebecca Young "Sustainability in Three Rivers – An opportunity to discuss how to make Three Rivers carbon neutral by 2030"

With reference to reports below:

- How to make Three Rivers carbon neutral (report)
- How to make Three Rivers carbon neutral App B Rebecca looked at the report around achievements and the green expectations plan. The reports looked at waste and recycling and about sustainable travel. The reports also looked at planting trees. Rebecca Young reported that she would welcome any thoughts and the Council is looking to

appoint a Climate Change Officer soon. One of the elements of the report is to change behaviours, e.g. with businesses. Russell Ball reported that it was important to think about revenue budgets for tree planting, as well as initial capital funding. Tim Hill reported that climate change adaption is not just about planting trees and all habitats were important to work toward this goal. Re-wilding projects are also very good for providing a C02 buffer and for biodiversity. Jon Tankard reported that rewilding projects were good. Tim Hill reported that he was working with Stevenage Borough Council on a re-wilding verge project there. Tim has discussed briefly about the state of nature report and will be inviting some Three Rivers District Council Councillors and Officers to a State of Nature Launch on 24th March. Barnaby Jackson mentioned about making Sarratt more sustainable and was funding available? Rebecca Young reported that there might be funding available. Cllr Williams reported that it would be important to contact landowners, County Councils, District Councils and Parish Councils and Local County Councillors about this, as they may be able to help with potential projects. Timothy Tims reported that it would be good to get a programme for replacing trees, e.g. in roads as there does not seem to be a programme for tree replenishment. Timothy reported that it would be good to get funding for this and replace trees in Three Rivers. Russell Ball commented on the issue about car parking on grass verges. Councillor Phil Williams reported that damage to grass verges can be reported to Hertfordshire County Council. Rebecca Young reported that it may be good for the future Three Rivers District Council Climate Officer to meet with Tim Hill, especially to discuss soil and carbon capture issues. Tim Hill thanked Rebecca Young. 6.
