Scope update

In our audit planning report tabled at the 26th March 2019 Audit Committee meeting, we provided you with an overview of our audit scope and approach for the audit of the financial statements. We carried out our audit in accordance with this plan, with the following exceptions:

Changes in materiality: In our Audit Committee Planning Report, we communicated that our audit procedures would be performed using a materiality of £1,060,000, with performance materiality, at 50% of overall materiality, of £531,000, and a threshold for reporting misstatements of £53,000. For year end, we updated our planning materiality assessment using the draft financial statements and have also reconsidered our risk assessment. Based on our materiality measure of gross expenditure on provision of services, we have updated our overall materiality assessment to £1,030,000. This results in updated performance materiality, at 50% of overall materiality, of £516,000, and an updated threshold for reporting misstatements of £51,000.

Status of the audit

We have substantially completed our audit of Three Rivers District Council's financial statements for the year ended 31st March 2019 and have performed the procedures outlined in our audit planning report. Subject to satisfactory completion of our procedures, we expect to issue an unqualified opinion on the Authority's financial statements in the form which appears at Section 3. However until the following work is complete, further amendments may arise:

- Receipt and review of estimated indexation movements from 1 April 2018 to 31 March 2019 on Land and Buildings not included in the annual cycle of valuations this year to support completion of valuations testing;
- · Reconciliation of Property, Plant and Equipment disclosures to the supporting subledgers;
- Testing of Property, Plant and Equipment;
- Testing disclosures for Officers remuneration, Exit packages, Related parties; Reserves; IFRS9 and IFRS15 impacts assessments; and the Collection Fund disclosures.
- Receipt and review of revised draft accounts, reflecting all accounting and disclosure adjustments to date and Authority-led updates across areas of agreed adjustments such as the pensions changes and narrative disclosure changes;
- Pension Liability testing and review of revised IAS19 report from the actuary received on 28 June 2019. Testing of actuarial calculations, assumptions and subsequent amendments to financial accounting;
- Receipt and review of letters of assurance from management and those charged with governance;
- NDR Appeals provision testing;
- Journal Entry Testing;
- Procedures for debtors, creditors, income testing and expenditure testing;
- Review of the Head of Shared Internal Audit Services Annual Audit Opinion;
- Completion of procedures required by the NAO to review and report on the Whole of Government Accounts return; and
- EY Manager and Associate Partner review of audit working papers.

We expect to issue the audit certificate at the same time as the audit opinion.



Audit differences

As at the date of drafting this audit report:

One audit difference has been identified for adjustment from our work. The IAS19 report received from Hymans Robertson on 12th April was revised on 28th June. Net Pension Liabilities were restated from £25,929,000 to £26,672,000, with an overall net increase in Total Comprehensive Expenditure of £743,000. Details are shown in Section 4 of this report.

There are no unadjusted audit differences arising from our audit.

Areas of audit focus

Our audit planning report identified key areas of focus for our audit of Three Rivers District Council's financial statements This report sets out our observations and conclusions, including our views on areas which might be conservative, and where there is potential risk and exposure. We summarise our consideration of these matters, and any others identified, in the "Key Audit Issues" section of this report.

We ask you to review these and any other matters in this report to ensure:

- There are no other considerations or matters that could have an impact on these issues
- You agree with the resolution of the issue
- There are no other significant issues to be considered.

There are no matters, apart from those reported by management or disclosed in this report, which we believe should be brought to the attention of the Audit Committee.



Control observations

We have adopted a fully substantive approach, so have not tested the operation of controls.

Value for money

We have considered your arrangements to take informed decisions; deploy resources in a sustainable manner; and work with partners and other third parties.

We have no matters to report about your arrangements to secure economy efficiency and effectiveness in your use of resources. Our work was still subject to Manager and Associate Partner review at the time of writing this report.

Other reporting issues

We have reviewed the information presented in the Annual Governance Statement for consistency with our knowledge of the Authority. We have no matters to report as a result of this work. Our work was still subject to Manager and Associate Partner review at the time of writing this report.

Our procedures include those required by the National Audit Office (NAO) on the Whole of Government Accounts submission. This work was ongoing at the time of writing this report. Our work was still subject to Manager and Associate Partner review at the time of writing this report.

Significant risk

Misstatements due to fraud or error*

What is the risk?

As identified in ISA 240, management is in a unique position to perpetrate fraud because of its ability to manipulate accounting records directly or indirectly and prepare fraudulent financial statements by overriding controls that would otherwise appear to be operating effectively.

We identify and respond to this risk on every audit engagement.

What judgements are we focused on?

As part of our work we focused on the key judgemental areas of financial statements, such as accounting policies; unusual transactions; and the key accounting estimates.

What did we do?

- Inquired of management about risks of fraud and the controls put in place to address those
- Understood the oversight given by those charged with governance of management's processes over fraud;
- Considered of the effectiveness of management's controls designed to address the risk of fraud;
- Tested the appropriateness of journal entries recorded in the general ledger and other adjustments made in the preparation of the financial statements;
- Assessed accounting estimates for evidence of management bias; and
- Evaluated the business rationale for significant unusual transactions.

What are our conclusions?

Overall our audit work did not identify any material issues or unusual transactions to indicate any misreporting of the Authority's financial position. Our work was ongoing at the time of writing this report. As at that date no adjusted or unadjusted differences had been identified.





Significant risk

Incorrect accounting for manual accruals*

What is the risk?

[Under ISA 240 there is a presumed risk that revenue may be misstated due to improper revenue recognition. In the public sector, this requirement is modified by Practice Note 10, issued by the Financial Reporting Council, which states that auditors should also consider the risk that material misstatements may occur by the manipulation of expenditure recognition.

In considering how the risk of management override may present itself, we conclude that this is primarily through management taking action to override controls and manipulate in year financial transactions that impact the financial position.

A key way of improving the revenue position is through inappropriate timing or measurement of estimates, manual accruals around the year end being a typical estimate that could be affected.

What judgements are we focused on?

Correctness of recognition of manual accruals within accounting periods.

What did we do?

We will focus our journals testing strategy around the year-end period, with a particular focus on those manual entries that impact income and expenditure.

Where there is any management estimation or assumptions involved in the calculation of year end accruals we will ensure that the rationale provided by management is appropriate and clearly documented on file via minutes of conversations held by management.

What are our conclusions?

Our work was ongoing at the time of writing this report. As at that date no adjusted or unadjusted differences had been identified.





What is the risk/area of focus?

Valuation of Other Land and Buildings

Land and Buildings within Property, Plant and Equipment were valued at £52,519,000 at 31 March 2018 and Investment Properties were valued at £3,369,000 as at that date. These represent significant balances in Three River's District Council's accounts and will be subject to valuation changes. Management is required to provide material judgemental inputs and apply estimation techniques to calculate the year-end balances recorded in the balance sheet. Detailed valuation work is undertaken by the Council's valuers Wilkes, Head and Eve.

Wilkes, Head and Eve plan to undertake detailed revaluation work at the end of December and the Council plans to apply an adjustment to reflect estimated valuation movements in the last three months of the year. We note that on 29th March 2019 the UK is scheduled to leave the European Union and due to uncertainties fluctuations in value may be more difficult to predict around this time.

What did we do?

- Considered the work performed by the Council's valuers Wilkes, Head and Eve , including the scope of the work performed on valuations at 31 December 2018 and a comparison of valuation findings with market trends and Land Registry data; data and assumptions used by the valuers; and qualifications and expertise.
- Confirmed effective procedures are applied by the Council to roll forward valuations from 31 December 2018 to the year end.
- Considered the annual cycle of valuations to ensure that assets have been valued within a 5 year rolling programme as required by the Code for PPE and annually for Investment Properties. We will also consider if there are any specific changes to assets that have occurred and that these have been communicated to the valuer.
- Reviewed any assets not subject to valuation in 2018/19 to confirm that the remaining asset base is not materially misstated. Consider changes to useful economic lives as a result of the most recent valuation.
- Tested accounting entries have been correctly processed in the financial statements.
- Reviewed valuer reports and findings to determine whether specialist EY valuer review of methodologies, data and assumptions is required.

Our work was ongoing at the time of writing this report. As at that date no adjusted or unadjusted differences had been identified.

We note also that at the time of writing this report, the UK's departure from the European Union had been delayed.

Other Additions to the Capital Programme

2017-18 saw Additions to Property, Plant and Equipment of £13,464,000. Even with routine capital acquisitions and enhancements, there is an inherent risk that revenue expenditure (e.g. repairs and maintenance) could be incorrectly capitalised.

Sample tested additions to Property, Plant and Equipment to confirm they meet appropriate criteria for capitalisation.

Our work was ongoing at the time of writing this report. There were no adjusted or unadjusted differences identified from our testing.



What is the risk/area of focus?

Valuation of Pension Fund Assets and Liabilities

The Local Authority Accounting Code of Practice and IAS19 require the Council to make extensive disclosures within its financial statements regarding its membership of the Local Government Pension Scheme administered by Hertfordshire County Council.

Three Rivers District Council's pension fund assets and liabilities are material estimated balances and the Code requires that the liability be disclosed on the Council's balance sheet. At 31 March 2018 the net liability was valued at £21,724,000. As noted in our Audit Results Report for 2017-18, this balance was stated gross of an adjustment to increase pension fund assets by £1,400,000, being the Council's share of the difference between the actuary's valuation of the Pension Fund's assets and the Fund's auditor's assessment of those asset values.

Asset and Liability values captured in Three Rivers District Council's 2018-19 accounts will again derive from information issued to the Council by the actuary to Hertfordshire County Council and will again involve significant estimation and judgement.

We note that on 29th March 2019 the UK is scheduled to leave the European Union and asset values may be particularly difficult to estimate around this time. We note also that ISAs (UK and Ireland) 500 and 540 require us to undertake procedures on the use of management experts and the assumptions underlying fair value estimates.

What did we do?

- Liaised with the auditors of Hertfordshire County Council Pension Fund, to obtain assurances over the information supplied to the actuary in relation to Three Rivers District Council.
- Assessed the work of the Pension Fund actuary (Hymans Robertson) including the assumptions they have used.
- Reviewed and test the accounting entries and disclosures made within Three Rivers District Council's financial statements in relation to IAS19.

The net Pension Liability was valued at £25,929,000 by Hymans Robertson in their12th April 2019 IAS19 Accounting Summary to Three Rivers District Council.

However, a national issue has resulted in a relatively late change to the District Council accounts and IAS19 disclosures. It relates to legal rulings regarding age discrimination arising from public sector pension scheme transitional arrangements, commonly described as the McCloud ruling. The unaudited Statement of Accounts recognised this matter as a contingent liability. However, since the year-end there has been additional evidence, including the ruling by the Supreme Court on 27th June 2019 which denied the Government's leave to appeal, which suggested that the amounts should in fact be treated as a constructive obligation and so included in the IAS19 liability disclosed within the financial statements. On 28 June 2019, a revised actuarial report was issued by Hymans Robertson restating this to £26,672,000.

Our work was ongoing at the time of writing this report. The increase in the overall value of the defined benefit liability will be reflected in a revised version of the accounts, and work to ensure the correct adjustment is ongoing as at the date of drafting this report.

What is the risk/area of focus?

Accounting for South Oxhey Park

In our review of the draft financial statements, we identified that the accounting entries in relation to the South Oxhey development did not reflect the change in intended future use of the assets. Following discussions with officers, we concluded that the planned use, the substance of which changed with effect from the 31 March 2018, required adjustments to be made in the accounts. The South Oxhey project was accordingly reclassified from Plant Property and Equipment and Investment Properties to inventory at year end, on the basis that the assets are to be developed and sold to a third party (Countryside – property developer). The net impact was to increase inventories by £4,900,000 and the deferral of £18,100,000 of other income in income statement to the deferred revenue receipt account. At the time of writing this report, the intention was to continue with this accounting treatments for 2018-19.

What did we do?

We confirmed there has been no change in the intended future of the asset and the accounting treatment remains consistent with our understanding. At 31 March 2019, South Oxhey Park inventory and deferred income were valued at £16,277,000. Our work was ongoing at the time of writing this report. As at that date no adjusted or unadjusted differences had been identified.

Valuation of NNDR Appeals Provision

Three Rivers District Council's NNDR Appeal Provision was valued at £1,604,000 at 31 March 2018. This is a high value estimate driven by complex calculations.

We considered the work performed by Inform, including the scope of the work, data provided to Inform and assumptions used.

Compared the level of appeals at 31 March 2019 and 31 March 2018 to assess the reasonableness of amounts provided for at year end.

Our work was ongoing at the time of writing this report. As at that date no adjusted or unadjusted differences had been identified.



What is the risk/area of focus?

New Accounting Standards IFRS 9 financial instruments

This new accounting standard is applicable for local authority accounts from the 2018/19 financial year and will change:

How financial assets are classified and measured;

How the impairment of financial assets are calculated; and

The disclosure requirements for financial assets.

There are transitional arrangements within the standard; and the 2018/19 Cipfa Code of practice on local authority accounting provides guidance on the application of IFRS 9. However, until the Guidance Notes are issued and any statutory overrides are confirmed there remains some uncertainty on the accounting treatment.

What did we do?

Assessed the authority's implementation arrangements that should include an impact assessment paper setting out the application of the new standard, transitional adjustments and planned accounting for 2018/19;

Considered the classification and valuation of financial instrument assets:

Reviewed new expected credit loss model impairment calculations for assets; and

Checked additional disclosure requirements. Our work was ongoing at the time of writing this report. As at that date no adjusted or unadjusted differences had been identified.

IFRS 15 Revenue from contracts with customers

This new accounting standard is applicable for local authority accounts from the 2018/19 financial year. The key requirements of the standard cover the identification of performance obligations under customer contracts and the linking of income to the meeting of those performance obligations.

The 2018/19 Cipfa Code of practice on local authority accounting provides guidance on the application of IFRS 15 and includes a useful flow diagram and commentary on the main sources of LG revenue and how they should be recognised.

The impact on local authority accounting is likely to be limited as large revenue streams like council tax, non domestic rates and government grants will be outside the scope of IFRS 15. However where that standard is relevant, the recognition of revenue will change and new disclosure requirements will be introduced.

Assessed the authority's implementation arrangements that should include an impact assessment paper setting out the application of the new standard, transitional adjustments and planned accounting for 2018/19. This will include Local Authority Trading Companies consolidated into the Authority's Group Accounts:

Considered application to the authority's revenue streams, and where the standard is relevant test to ensure revenue is recognised when (or as) it satisfies a performance obligation; and

Checked additional disclosure requirements. Our work was ongoing at the time of writing this report. As at that date no adjusted or unadjusted differences had been identified.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF THREE RIVERS DISTRICT COUNCIL

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Three Rivers District Council for the year ended 31 March 2019 under the Local Audit and Accountability Act 2014. The financial statements comprise the:

- Authority Movement in Reserves Statement;
- Authority Comprehensive Income and Expenditure Statement;
- Authority Balance Sheet;
- Authority Cash Flow Statement;
- The related notes 1 to 39 to the Authority accounts; and
- Collection Fund and the related notes CF1 and CF2;

The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and the CIPFA/LASAAC Code of Practice on Local Authority Accounting in the United Kingdom 2018/19.

In our opinion the financial statements:

- give a true and fair view of the financial position of Three Rivers District Council as at 31 March 2019 and of its expenditure and income for the year then ended; and

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

The maintenance and integrity of the Three Rivers District Council web site is the responsibility of the directors; the work carried out by the auditors does not involve consideration of these matters and, accordingly, the auditors accept no responsibility for any changes that may have occurred to the financial statements since they were initially presented on the web site. Legislation in the United Kingdom governing the preparation and dissemination of financial statements may differ from legislation in other jurisdictions.





Audit Differences

In the normal course of any audit, we identify misstatements between amounts we believe should be recorded in the financial statements and the disclosures and amounts actually recorded. These differences are classified as "known" or "judgemental". Known differences represent items that can be accurately quantified and relate to a definite set of facts or circumstances. Judgemental differences generally involve estimation and relate to facts or circumstances that are uncertain or open to interpretation.

Summary of adjusted differences

We highlight the following misstatements greater than £516,000 which have been corrected by management that were identified during the course of our audit:

Net Pension Liabilities increased by £743,000. Total Comprehensive Expenditure also increased by £743,000.

As more fully explained on page 12, this change was to reflect the impact of legal rulings regarding age discrimination arising from public sector pension scheme transitional arrangements, commonly described as the McCloud ruling.

There were no uncorrected misstatements.



Value for Money



Background

We are required to consider whether the Council has put in place 'proper arrangements' to secure economy, efficiency and effectiveness on its use of resources. This is known as our value for money conclusion.

For 2018/19 this is based on the overall evaluation criterion:

"In all significant respects, the audited body had proper arrangements to ensure it took properly informed decisions and deployed resources to achieve planned and sustainable outcomes for taxpayers and local people"

Proper arrangements are defined by statutory guidance issued by the National Audit Office. They comprise your arrangements to:

- Take informed decisions:
- Deploy resources in a sustainable manner; and
- Work with partners and other third parties.

In considering your proper arrangements, we will draw on the requirements of the CIPFA/SOLACE framework for local government to ensure that our assessment is made against a framework that you are already required to have in place and to report on through documents such as your annual governance statement.

Overall conclusion

We did not identify any significant risks around these criteria.

We therefore expect having no matters to report about your arrangements to secure economy, efficiency and effectiveness in your use of resources subject to completion of our work in this area.



Other reporting issues

Consistency of other information published with the financial statements, including the Annual Governance Statement

We must give an opinion on the consistency of the financial and non-financial information in the Annual Governance Statement with the audited financial statements.

We must also review the Annual Governance Statement for completeness of disclosures, consistency with other information from our work, and whether it complies with relevant guidance.

Financial information in the Annual Governance Statement and published with the financial statements was consistent with the audited financial statements.

We have reviewed the Annual Governance Statement and can confirm it is consistent with other information from our audit of the financial statements and we have no other matters to report. Our work was still subject to Manager and Associate Partner review at the time of writing this report.

Whole of Government Accounts

Alongside our work on the financial statements, we also review and report to the National Audit Office on your Whole of Government Accounts return. The extent of our review, and the nature of our report, is specified by the National Audit Office.

We have not yet completed our work in this area and will report any matters arising to the Audit Committee.

Other powers and duties

We have a duty under the Local Audit and Accountability Act 2014 to consider whether to report on any matter that comes to our attention in the course of the audit, either for the Authority to consider it or to bring it to the attention of the public (i.e. "a report in the public interest"). We did not identify any issues which required us to issue a report in the public interest.

We also have a duty to make written recommendations to the Authority, copied to the Secretary of State, and take action in accordance with our responsibilities under the Local Audit and Accountability Act 2014.

We did not identify any issues.

Other matters

As required by ISA (UK&I) 260 and other ISAs specifying communication requirements, we must tell you significant findings from the audit and other matters if they are significant to your oversight of the Three Rivers District Council's financial reporting process. At the time of writing this report, there were no matters to report.





Assessment of Control Environment

Financial controls

It is the responsibility of the Authority to develop and implement systems of internal financial control and to put in place proper arrangements to monitor their adequacy and effectiveness in practice. Our responsibility as your auditor is to consider whether the Authority has put adequate arrangements in place to satisfy itself that the systems of internal financial control are both adequate and effective in practice.

As part of our audit of the financial statements, we obtained an understanding of internal control sufficient to plan our audit and determine the nature, timing and extent of testing performed. As we have adopted a fully substantive approach, we have therefore not tested the operation of controls.

Although our audit was not designed to express an opinion on the effectiveness of internal control we are required to communicate to you significant deficiencies in internal control.

We have not identified any significant deficiencies in the design or operation of an internal control that might result in a material misstatement in your financial statements of which you are not aware.





Use of Data Analytics in the Audit

Data analytics

Analytics Driven Audit

Data analytics

We used our data analysers to enable us to capture entire populations of your financial data. These analysers:

- Help identify specific exceptions and anomalies which can then be the focus of our substantive audit tests; and
- Give greater likelihood of identifying errors than traditional, random sampling techniques.

In 2018/19, our use of these analysers in the authority's audit included testing journal entries, to identify and focus our testing on those entries we deem to have the highest inherent risk to the audit.

We capture the data through our formal data requests and the data transfer takes place on a secured EY website. These are in line with our EY data protection policies which are designed to protect the confidentiality, integrity and availability of business and personal information.

Journal Entry Analysis

We obtain downloads of all financial ledger transactions posted in the year. We perform completeness analysis over the data, reconciling the sum of transactions to the movement in the trial balances and financial statements to ensure we have captured all data. Our analysers then review and sort transactions, allowing us to more effectively identify and test journals that we consider to be higher risk, as identified in our audit planning report.






Journal Entry Data Insights

The graphic outlined below summarises the journal population for 2018/19. We review journals by certain risk based criteria to focus on higher risk transactions, such as journals posted manually by management, those posted around the year-end, those with unusual debit and credit relationships, and those posted by individuals we would not expect to be entering transactions.

The purpose of this approach is to provide a more effective, risk focused approach to auditing journal entries, minimising the burden of compliance on management by minimising randomly selected samples.





Journal Entry Testing


What is the risk?

In line with ISA 240 we are required to test the appropriateness of journal entries recorded in the general ledger and other adjustments made in the preparation of the financial statements.

Journal entry data criteria - 31 March 2019

What judgements are we focused on?

Using our analysers we are able to take a risk based approach to identify journals with a higher risk of management override, as outlined in our audit planning report.



What did we do?

We obtained general ledger journal data for the period and have used our analysers to identify characteristics typically associated with inappropriate journal entries or adjustments, and journals entries that are subject to a higher risk of management override.

We then performed tests on the journals identified to determine if they were appropriate and reasonable.

What are our conclusions?

We isolated a sub set of journals for further investigation and obtained supporting evidence to verify the posting of these transactions and concluded that they were appropriately stated.







We confirm that there are no changes in our assessment of independence since our confirmation in our audit planning board report dated 26th March 2019.

We complied with the FRC Ethical Standards and the requirements of the PSAA's Terms of Appointment. In our professional judgement the firm is independent and the objectivity of the audit engagement partner and audit staff has not been compromised within the meaning of regulatory and professional requirements.

We consider that our independence in this context is a matter which you should review, as well as us. It is important that you and your Audit Committee consider the facts known to you and come to a view. If you would like to discuss any matters concerning our independence, we will be pleased to do this at the meeting of the Audit Committee on 23rd July.

We confirm we have not undertaken non-audit work outside the NAO Code requirements other than certification of HB grant claims.
